The anticipation would begin when the Christmas Edition of the Sears and Roebuck catalogs arrived. Ma had first dibs on thumbing through the pages. We knew she wasn't looking through the toy section. We did receive toys but just one or two. What we did receive was new underwear and socks, PJs, and shoes or boots – stuff we needed but didn't really appreciate at the time. Today, practical gifts are desired. Not that I want anyone to buy me underwear (they would probably think I wear granny panties. I'm not telling). But nice comfy fleece PJs from LL Bean might be nice. Hint, hint.

Although we had lots of cousins, an aunt or two, and a couple of uncles, we were pretty isolated as

a family. The grown-ups didn't visit each other, taking their tribe of children along to spread holiday cheer. Ma's older sister lived within walking distance of less than a mile, vet she sent one of her older children to our house with gifts and left with the ones designated for their family. "Bye! Thanks for stopping by." The cousins were friendly enough, but I wouldn't say "jolly." None of us, after a certain age,



were jolly. Call it generational moodiness.

Anyways, we could open one gift, a small one, on Christmas Eve. We were grateful for everything we received so if the gift we selected for this opening tradition was just a coloring book and new box of crayons or the aforementioned underwear, we were pleased. The main event the next day would make up for it.

When my mind wanders through memories, sepia toned like old photographs, most just blend into a warm montage of homemade eggnog, not the mutinous mess in the local dairy case, bread pudding with raisins, sparkling metallic tinsel, and the smell of a real Christmas tree. making some loud yipping sounds. I carefully moved my head from side to side so I could more fully take it all in. Miniature pots and pans, tiny utensils, a serving set, and a dinner set. I knew then and there Santa was a myth. I'd thank my parents directly for this surprise.

I don't know how long I simply drooled over that tiny kitchen wishing the sun would come up like magic and chase night away. I had work to do, meals to prepare and dishes to wash.

I did eventually go back up those stairs, back to bed, and back to sleep. But my dreams were not of sugar plums, they were of lining up my dolls and feeding them breakfast.

If I could talk to Ma, I would tell her this story

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
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Whale Watching and Ghost Stories

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
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submarine.

When is it Time to Take Away the Car Keys? What Does The Doctor Say? By Dr. Edward Hoffer

Our ability to safely drive varies enormously. Even though 75% of surveyed drivers felt that their skill behind the wheel was in the top 25%, statistics do apply, and 25% of us are in the bottom 25%.

Many factors determine whether someone should still be driving a car. Teens and young adults tend to take more risks than older drivers while older drivers have poorer vision, slower reaction time, are likely to be taking medication that may compromise driving safety, and are at greater risk of cognitive decline.

The latest survey available showed that in 2020, 59% of people 85 and older in the U.S. still had their driving license.

Older drivers are not necessarily bad drivers; that distinction clearly goes to teenage drivers, who have by far the greatest number of accidents and fatalities. Accidents are relatively low for drivers 30 to 69 and then start going up.





What is of concern is that the number of fatal accidents rises dramatically in drivers 80 and older.

So, what do you do if your parent or spouse should not be driving? Many states require older drivers to have their vision checked at license renewal, but none require a driving test.

You cannot rely on your doctor to be proactive; only six U.S. states require doctors to report people whose medical condition makes it unsafe to drive.

If you have witnessed unsafe practices such as running lights or stop signs, drifting across lanes or driving way below the speed limit on highways, you should bring the subject up. If this is met with denial, you could contact their doctor and ask the doctor to broach the

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subject.

If someone is clearly a risk to themselves and others, you may need to contact the registry of motor vehicles or local police department in a smaller community. In the extreme, you can make the car undriveable by disconnecting the battery.

The corollary is figuring out how to let them get places without a car – often a major issue for those who do not live in a densely populated area with shops and services within walking distance.

Sign them up for Uber or Lyft, contact the local Council on Aging about community resources and / or offer to drive them to medical appointments and shopping or arrange for others to do so. In much of the





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country, to be unable to drive dramatically shrinks a person's world.

Just maybe, if you make good alternatives available, they will give up driving and save a life.

Commission Treasurer and State Senator Present Check to Rochester

Rochester Select Board **By Michael J. DeCicco**

Plymouth County Commission Treasurer Tom O'Brien and State Senator Michael J. Rodrigues came to Rochester Monday to present its Board of Selectmen a \$413,605 check for new Police Department digital radios and new Fire Department turnout gear.

The oversize cardboard check the pair came to town hall with represented two actual checks Rochester has been granted from county ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) monies, O'Brien explained. One is a \$234,000



check for the radios. The other is \$189,520 for the firefighter gear.

O'Brien boasted Plymouth County was the first county to spend every penny of the ARPA funds it had been allocated and at a lower operational cost than the other Massachusetts communities. "The average cost to administer is 7-8 percent," he said. "We administered using 1.4 percent because other counties partnered with us to administer the funds."



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Next, the board approved the placement of a new Eversource Energy 'stub' utility pole on the south side of Hartley Road as proposed by Verizon New England INC and NSTAR Electric Company. This approval came after objections from Highway Surveyor who said he would rather see the pole on the island there. Selectman Brad Morse agreed. "My concern is visibility of the road to motorists," he said. The Verizon representative said the company had already answered Eldridge's request to place the pole further off the road, as far as was possible.'

In other action, the board approved placing a proposal to create a Town Administrator bylaw with a set of regulations for the position on the January 27, 2025 Special Town Meeting warrant. This vote came after Town Administrator Cameron Durant reported that he and the town's labor counsel Jane Friedman had worked together to create the proposal. Both selectmen who were present, Brad Morse and Adam Murphy, said they were satisfied with the results and moved to place the measure on the The board appointed six members to the warrant. new Events Committee who will serve three-year terms. They are Sarah Paiva, Kami Mederios, Renee Duffy, Maureen Viera, Sharon Hartley and Michelle Hamilton. Durant noted there is one spot open on the seven-member board and anyone who would like to join should send town hall a letter of interest.

The board also appointed its first member to the Opioid Task Force, Michael Kovadevich, who will serve a



three-year term.

The selectmen continued until its next meeting discussion of increasing building increases proposed by Building Commissioner Paul Boucher and approving a new Police Department towing policy. Both issues had to be delayed because there was no third member; Paul Ciaburri was unable to attend.

Murphy said he struggles with increasing building fees only because the town's number of building permits went down this past year. "The cost of permit should meet the cost to administer it," he said. "I struggle to pass a cost like that to the consumer." Morse said he had no problem with increasing fees to align with surrounding communities' fee rates and acknowledged a third board member is needed to break the tie.

Police chief Michael A. Assad, Jr. explained the new towing policy would add regulation of the towing companies the town uses. Driver must look and act the part, Assad said. The policy requires proper licensing and insurance and bars use of any controlled substance, cannabis or alcohol on the job.

The next meeting of the Rochester Select Board is scheduled for Monday, December 16 at 6:00 pm at 1 Constitution Way.

Single Tax Rate Maintained Mattapoisett Select Board By Marilou Newell

The December 3 meeting of the Mattapoisett Select Board may have been brief but that doesn't mean it wasn't packed with important data for anyone owning real estate in this seaside community.

The board met with Mia Robertson, Administrator of Accessing, and Cary LeBlanc, Accessor, to discuss whether or not the town should maintain a single tax rate or move to splitting it up.

Robertson reported that real and personal property assessed value for 2025 stands at \$2,727,293,119 an increase of 2-percent. The tax levy is proposed at \$29,345,673.96, an increase of 4.4-percent. The average single family home value pegged at \$744,594.

Regarding the tax burden on real estate holders,



it was noted that shifting the tax rate from a single classification to a segmented rate would not create a benefit for taxpayers. Of the tax rate itself, \$10.76 will be the updated rate an increase of 2.4-percent. The average real estate tax bill for a single family home is proposed to be \$8,011.83. Residential properties constitute 94.0271-percent of the tax base while commercial, industrial, and personal property a mere 5.9729-percent by comparison. The report further noted that the average single-family home value now stands at \$744,594.

Also reported was expected new growth at \$37,341,000. But Robertson cautioned that real estate transactions in the form of new home starts is slowing. She said as the town reaches maximum build out, new growth will be impacted. Robertson did add that renovated properties however, will continue to hold steady for now. The board approved maintaining a single tax rate.

In other business the board renewed a number of annual licenses, accepted a donation from the Mattapoisett Land Trust for the town's new buoy holiday tree, and accepted the resignation of Stanley Cornwall from the Disability Commission.

The board also announced that the annual Holiday in Shipyard Park will be held on December 14 between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Select Board was not scheduled at adjournment.

Lightning-Fast Select Board Meeting

The Marion Select Board met in a lighting fast meeting on Tuesday, December 3. The meeting began with the approval of minutes from three meetings, October 7, October 16, and November 6. Minutes were approved by unanimous vote.

The next agenda item was approving liquor licenses. The board unanimously approved all outstanding requests, though the Board of Health will also need to comply with said approval.

For the Alcohol Beverage Control Commission, the board unanimously approved the town's estimated seasonal population, at 5,490 people. This is up from around 5,100 last year as stated by a board member.

For next year's meetings, the board unanimously approved the recommended meeting dates for 2025. No comments or adjustments were added with one board member saying, "we're flexible."

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In water and sewage commitments, the board unanimously approved \$10,000 for West Drive sewage connections, now up to around 12 houses per a board member. It was stated the area should see more sewer tieins as West Drive is a "sensitive area" near the sea. They also approved \$4745.90 in final readings.

With that, the board convened with "Merry Christmas" and "Happy Holidays."


Allegations of Sexism at Marion Meeting Marion Planning Board

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
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
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Board meeting on Monday when board member Eileen Marum mentioned that since August, some of her meeting minutes have been edited by the board chair to remove emotional language.

Marum said in the past, she has been ignored by male members of the board. As the board clerk, she has been composing minutes and since August, when some meetings have been contentious, she has noted it in the minutes.

Board members, including Ryan Burke and Chairman Andrew Daniel, dismissed allegations of sexism. They mentioned that board minutes should not reflect emotional language, and Daniel was not trying to dismiss any concerns raised by Marum.

The board ultimately voted 3-0 to have the administrative assistant, Danyca Filatreault, take over the duties of composing meeting minutes. Marum and fellow female board member Allana Nelson, the board's vice chair, abstained from the vote.

Town Planner Doug Guey-Lee said the issue of town officials writing meeting minutes and subsequent controversy over biased or emotional language is not isolated to Marion.

He recommended that the administrative assistant conduct the minutes – a more common practice across town governments nationwide. Guey-Lee said that an administrative assistant usually is someone staffed by the town with no political "stake" in the game.



"Everywhere else I look, it is typically the administrative assistant who has the best chance of being objective and impartial," Guey-Lee said.

"It is hard for board members to write the minutes when you have a stake in the discussion," Guey-Lee said. "The administrative assistant is a staff person, and they have no skin in the game."

Marum said that the controversy began last August when contentious issues came forward, including possible open meeting law violations or alleged issues of board members not reviewing important materials before the start of a meeting, she alleged.

Marum said that there has been a history of sexism against her, with board members ignoring her questions or not acknowledging her raised hand for input. She said Chairman Andrew Daniel editing her wording is a different form of "harassment."

Marum said she expected that Daniel would write an addendum to the minutes but not remove her language that expressed the emotional tenor of the discussions.

"It (the harassment) has taken a different twist, and the chairman has decided he will remove my words from the minutes. So, it is just a different form of harassment," Marum said.

Nelson said that Marum for more than three years has written objective and accurate minutes, and these last few months have just been an "ugly pimple" on her mostly impeccable record of writing minutes.



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Some board members took umbrage with Marum's claims.

"It is so insanely out of line," member Ryan Burke said of the sexism claims. "It is disgusting."

Members agreed, however, that complaints about the minutes and the emotional language have distracted the board from other issues – including talks about shortterm rentals in town.

In other business, the board delayed hearings on two separate housing developments as the applicants are preparing more information – FSJ Marion Realty on Wareham Street and Mark Zuker's proposed affordable housing development on Wareham Road.



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> Notice of Intents Pushed Back Rochester Conservation Commission by Michael J. DeCicco

Rochester's Conservation Commission Tuesday re-opened its month-long review of four separate Notices of Intent to build single-family dwellings on two-acre lots at 0 High Street but ultimately continued all four hearings until its next meeting.

Since early November, the project has drawn the attention of abutters who have raised concerns about its possible effect on flooding and natural resources in their neighborhood. Tuesday, the board continued to next meeting its review of three of the project's lots because the Natural Heritage Foundation has yet to decide if its construction will affect endangered species. The board tabled a decision on a fourth lot to give an abutter's engineer time to review how the construction will affect his client's flooding problem.

Project representative Chris Wallace reported that Natural Heritage's latest correspondence says the construction on those lots will not affect habitat, but the organization needs to continue its review as to whether the project as a whole will affect habitat. Conservation Commission member Michael Gifford said he would be more comfortable waiting for the foundation's full answer before approving any Order of Conditions endorsing that work can start. The commissioners unanimously agreed.

When discussion turned to the fourth lot, its closest abutter, Jeremy Saccone, who previously said his



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property near County Road frequently floods because of the bog and will flood even more when a house lot is built near him, said his engineer has not had time to review the new mitigation measures Wallace has proposed, because that response was only issued a day before the meeting. Saccone wanted a two-week continuance to allow that review time. "This is new," Saccone said. "The new road is now on top of the bog road. The water will come directly back to me."

The board ultimately granted the two-week continuance to allow time for Saccone's engineer to respond even as it noted mitigating a flooding problem on upland is a little beyond its jurisdiction of protecting wetlands. "We have limited jurisdiction," member Ben Bailey said. "This is on the razor's edge of not our jurisdiction." Board Chair Christopher Gerrior motioned the continuance after Wallace noted he will have to return in two weeks for the other three lots anyway.

The commission began its meeting by approving a Request for Determination of applicability to the wetland's protection bylaws for a plan to construct a 16x24-foot shed partially within the 100-foot wetlands buffer zone at 324 High St. Homeowner Stephen Cobb told the commission he had taken this plan to the Zoning Board of Appeals. That board objected to the shed being placed in the front of the yard, which is against town regulation, leading to his decision to move the building closer to his side setback and possibly wetlands. The



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commission unanimously granted the project a Negative Determination, i.e. that the plan will not affect a wetland area, after Conservation Agent Merilee Kelly reported the new location is a lawn area, 85 feet from wetlands.

Next, the commission approved a request for a Certificate of Compliance of the Order of Conditions for a plan to build a new single-family home with driveway, septic system and associated grading at 127 Neck Road, after Kelly noted this construction had been successfully completed "a couple of years ago."

The board then granted a request for a three-year extension of the Order of Conditions filed by the MBTA for its property at 45 Kings Highway. Kelly reported that much of the construction project has finished. Project representative Jonathan Niro of BETA Group, Worcester, said the extension is being requested so project managers may continue monitoring the work and complete the parking lot.

The next Conservation Commission meeting will be December 17 at 7:00 pm, at town hall, 1 Constitution Way.

Pneumonia Cases on the Rise Marion Board of Health

The rise of pneumonia among youth in the school district and the issues of homeowners in waterfront districts were the main topics discussed at last week's



Board of Health meeting.

The meeting was less than 30 minutes but Patrick Tropeano, representing an application's engineering work at 38 Rocky Knook Lane, detailed issues the owners are having with their beach home.

Tropeano, a Board of Health member in Wareham, said such waterfront properties face many issues of this sort.

"This is a plethora of bad news for the owners of the property. They have a water table and wetlands that surround the property," Tropeano said during a hearing for the owners' plans for a septic system.

Tropeano also said the property has some poorly designed piping in the basement that also needs to be rectified.

"You can't get any worse than what we have with this one," Tropeano said.

The health board approved redrawn plans once the applicant receives clearance from the Conservation Commission.

Tropeano and the board talked at length about issues with flood zones in this area and how it is difficult for people to build and receive flood insurance in this area. Tropeano, citing his work on the health board in Wareham, discussed how the issue is growing among many South Coast communities.

Marion health officials acknowledged the issue and how it impacts those who own waterfront property.

The health board also discussed how COVID-19 and flu numbers have leveled out but that there has been an outbreak of pneumonia this year among school children.

The board still conducts vaccination clinics, however.

Health Director Lori Demarais said there are two doses of Covid and flu vaccines available through the health office.

The board approved a septic system on 99 Allen's Point Road under the condition that plans are redrawn so that the water line for the home is further from the septic leaching field.

The board approved plans for Ansel's Cafe's



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proposed connection to Wareham water, which is nearby and more accessible for any firefighting needs. The board received a letter from the state Department of Environmental Protection about the plan.

Board members also reported that they are in discussions with a Westport representative on how best to use \$5,000 in state grant funding through the Southcoast Public Health collaborative.

The board will meet next at 4:30 pm December 5 at the Marion Meeting house, 2 Spring Street.

From the Files of the Rochester Historical Society

One very interesting donation that the Historical Society received this year was a "six-board chest." This good-sized wooden chest is -have you guessed it? - made of exactly six boards - top, bottom, front, back and ends. The chest is 44″x 20″x 18″, so we know a good-sized tree must have been involved.

Written on the inside of the chest is the date and place it was made, Rochester, 1750. The chest was rescued from a home that was in the process of being demolished. A contractor was about to crush it and send it off to a landfill.



Robert Phillips saved it and after seeing the writing on the inside, he contacted us at the Rochester Historical Society, and it was delivered to the Museum in June. We don't know a lot about it, but we know it was owned by Branch Barrows, born August 25, 1774. He married Rebecca Clark on Thursday, June 17, 1802. As I said, "we don't know much," but we do know that Branch always kept his Sunday clothes in the chest and now the chest is back in Rochester.

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


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Movie Review Talk Talk

Heretic. Starring Hugh Grant, Sophie Thatcher, and Chloe East. Directed by Scott Beck and Bryan Woods. Running time: 111 minutes. MPAA rating: R. Now playing in theaters; coming to streaming media Dec. 10.

The consensus on the smug and somewhat pointless thriller *Heretic* is that it shows off a malevolent side of Hugh Grant's usual bookish, sardonic persona. But wasn't the malevolence always there? Even in his romantic comedies, I was never quite sure he was on the side of the angels (this was even before the scandal that his career probably wouldn't survive today), and that made him interesting to watch. Grant was always way ahead of us, better-read, better-prepared. So watching him enact all these elements as an official bad guy is a bit redundant. He's entertaining, to be sure. The problem is that the movie has been contrived to make sure he's entertaining in it, in exactly the way we're meant to be entertained.

Grant is Mr. Reed, a man who lives in a remote and drippy house. He has expected visitors: a pair of Mormon missionaries, Sister Barnes (Sophie Thatcher) and Sister Paxton (Chloe East), who show up at his door after he has contacted the local Mormon church and voiced interest in hearing more about their savior. He invites them in for pie, and they accept even though there's supposed to be a woman present; he assures them that he has a wife in the house, too shy to show herself. After a while it becomes clear that Mr. Reed has summoned these young women not to learn about their faith but to challenge it. After a longer while we and the missionaries figure out the situation may be much more dire than a mere agnostic lecture.

Lazily written and stylishly directed by Scott Beck and Bryan Woods, *Heretic* has been getting a pass, I fear, because it focuses much more on dialogue — as in the "let's have a dialogue" sense of the word — than on rote scares. But the scares are rote anyway, and after a thriller like, say, *Strange Darling* that pulls the rug out from under us with a minimum of chat, *Heretic* shakes out as predictable. We sort of know where it's going even if we don't know; its third-act revelations don't really surprise us. Mr. Reed puts on a condescending showand-tell using music (the Hollies, Radiohead) and board



games; his point is that religions are all iterations of each other. He's sure this insight will rock these Mormons' world. He doesn't seem to know or care that these young women may have nooks and crannies in their pasts that strengthen their faith beyond cynicism.

Oh, how I wished these missionaries (though acted adeptly) were given more complexity to counter Mr. Reed's mansplaining their faith to them. Now, my own take on faith and God (as distinct from organized religion) is pretty dumb and simple: I don't know and neither do you. But at least I'm not putting those words in the mouth of a chatty villain and expecting the audience to go "whoa." The plotting verges on stupid, and sometimes doesn't only verge, when Mr. Reed comes to seem like a cross between Hannibal Lecter and Jigsaw, concocting elaborate death-traps for innocent young visitors but making sure they know how smart he is. Craving twists that weren't going to arrive, I tuned out emotionally pretty early. The narrative has a downward-spiral structure, and by the time we see what Mr. Reed has been hiding in his basement, we don't gasp, we just let our eyelids slide shut in tired disdain.

The thing is, some of what Mr. Reed says makes sense, and some of what the missionaries say makes sense, and it'd be nice if the movie found a way to dramatize that without the characters tossing chunks of rhetoric at each other. The young women are drawn compassionately, and Grant's performance transcends the callow script; Mr. Reed basically delivers Anti-Religion 101, which might impress those who haven't heard it before. He, ironically, can't seem to separate out religion from faith; he's married to his "iterations" theory, like a smart-ass teenager who insists that, like, nothing is original, man. So the naive young women seem more savvy about the topics under discussion than he does. The film could have posited this as the point. It could have done a lot of intriguing things. Movies that are largely talk aren't bad, as long as the talk is worth listening to.

Scanography

Come to the Mattapoisett Free Public Library to see Donna St Amant's astonishing photography exhibit, called "Scanography," through **December 31**. Using a very unique process, Ms St Amant captures nature's treasures on a flatbed scanner.

Donna's love of capturing images began in the early '80s with black and white film and her own darkroom where she marveled at the development process. When the digital era began, replacing film and supplies became more difficult to find, and she stepped away as the extensive time on the computer required in that new format was too close to how she spent most of her workday as an engineer. She sought out more tangible ways to express herself and found working with metal, flame, and hammer as a metalsmith gave her the perfect balance.

Now in retirement, she has rekindled her love of photography. St Amant captures the close-up detail and beauty of flowers, worn beached objects, and elements of nature on a high-resolution flatbed scanner in a process often called "Scanography." Once used to digitize her photographic negatives, the scanner is now her 'studio camera' and the fine detail it captures never ceases to amaze her. Whether a single bloom or a 'medley' of treasures, the objects are placed directly on the scanner glass with the cover left open building depth and layers from foreground to background. Using a preview feature, St Amant can see the image as it will be recorded and can rearrange elements until it is just what she had imagined.

To St Amant, this process feels somewhat like organizing a group portrait. She places the individuals near one another in a pleasing and cohesive composition, intertwines outreaching elements to project a feeling of connection, and then captures the moment. Overall, she says "it's all about passion, the joy of creating ... and the continuous quest to learn and grow."
