The event provided all Old Rochester Regional High School students with opportunities to engage in meaningful service projects, promoting empathy, responsibility, and connection to the community. Over 20 volunteer activities were offered, ranging from writing letters to soldiers and assembling care packages for local senior citizens, to campus beautification. The event also included off-site opportunities to distribute food to people in need at Damien's Pantry and help in the warehouse at Friends of Jack.

"We are incredibly proud of our students and staff for their enthusiastic participation in this first-of-its-kind event," Superintendent Nelson said. "We hope that it's the first of many. This first annual schoolwide Community Service-Learning Day reflects our commitment to developing not just learners, but leaders who give back to

"Without her leadership, this event would not have been possible," Superintendent Nelson said.

The day began with shortened classes, followed by a brief assembly where students were encouraged to reflect on the value of service. Then, the students participated in their selected projects, many of which directly benefited local organizations and individuals.

"Watching the students and faculty participate in the various service-learning activities with smiles on their faces was such a highlight," Interim Assistant Principal Lauren Millette said. "So many of the students reflected on how special it felt to give back. It was definitely a great day to be a Bulldog."



Other activities included creating handmade cards for hospitalized children, baking treats for local families for Thanksgiving, and helping to make blankets from fleece for PACE Headstart in New Bedford, to be given to the preschool students there. Some students kept busy knitting crocheted hats, scarves and mittens, to be donated to local homeless shelters.

"This day was a beautiful example of learning and connection," said Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning Dr. Sharlene Fedorowicz, who learned how to crochet with the students. "Joining our

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
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students to crochet scarves for those in need reminded me of the power of shared experiences and the lasting impact of giving back together."

Rose chose to donate the \$500 gift to the Marion



#### Killing Brian Thompson will not Solve America's Health Care Problems

What Does The Doctor Say?

The fatal shooting of UnitedHealthcare CEO Brian Thompson as he headed to a shareholder meeting should not have come as a surprise. The U.S. is a gun-obsessed culture and leads the world in gun fatalities. What was more shocking was the outpouring of "he had it coming" posts on social media.

Whether or not the killer was motivated by a personal experience with United, the numerous posts referenced people's rage at the health insurance industry.

Should we be surprised?

Recent years have seen health insurance rates soar and out-of-pocket costs skyrocket. Even those with employer-provided health insurance are often unable

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to pay for needed care as deductibles and copays keep rising.

At the same time, the industry has had one black eye after another, with multiple insurers in the news.

Private health insurance companies offering Medicare Advantage plans routinely overstate the health problems of their enrollees to get unjustified extra payments from the government.

A former Aetna medical director admitted under oath that he never looked at patients' records when deciding whether to approve or deny care but simply rubber-stamped the nurse reviewers' decisions.

United was castigated by a Senate committee for using algorithms to deny care and it was noted that the denial rate for rehab care after hospitalization rose from 10.9% in 2020 to 22.7% in 2022.

Denying care is good for insurers' profits, and these profits flow into executive salaries. The CEOs of America's six largest health insurers took home a total of \$122,970,614 in total compensation in 2023.

Taking money from employers and individuals and paying medical bills is not rocket science and does not warrant sky-high profits. Medicare operates with an overhead of about 3% while private insurers charge 15% or more.

As I document in my book, some 25% of U.S. "health care" expenditure does not go to health care but to administrative overhead.

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We need to get the excess profits out of health insurance companies and put that money towards patient care.

Shooting one CEO will not change the culture. We must hold our legislators' feet to the fire and get the excess profits out of health insurance, whether at the state or the federal level.

#### Clock Ticks Towards TikTok Ban

A friend of mine recently asked: "You're up to date on things, right? Is TikTok actually getting banned?" That brings us here. This is a non-issue to most. However, to the young among us, this is the dilemma of the ages.



According to Bloomberg, there are roughly 170 million monthly active users in the US. That's nearly half of all Americans, with those under 40 making up about 2/3 of its users. Pew Research Center claims "39% of adults under 30 say they regularly get news there, compared with much smaller shares of adults ages 30 to 49 (19%), 50 to 64 (9%) and 65 and older (3%)."

On Friday, December 6, a federal appeals court made up of three judges unanimously upheld the law which would force TikTok's parent company, ByteDance, to sell TikTok to an American-registered company by





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
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January 19, 2025. The company, the following Monday, filed an emergency motion in the court to delay the date until the Supreme Court can deliberate on the legality of the ban.

Should ByteDance not sell off TikTok by January 19 and the Supreme Court not challenge the law, app stores will be prohibited from offering the app and carriers, internet and cellular, will be blocked from transmitting TikTok data effectively halting all excess to app creators and content, bar the use of a VPN.

In terms of prospective purchasers for the social media giant, many have expressed interest from Canadian billionaire Kevin O'Leary to Microsoft. Whatever is happening behind closed doors is hard to tell, though there are still about six weeks left of negotiating any potential acquisition. It is hard to get an exact valuation of TikTok as it's a part of a greater whole, ByteDance. Though it is generally accepted the company is worth many tens-of-billions of dollars, if not over \$100 billion, with many thanks to the high valuation stemming from its revolutionary content-targeting algorithm.

While many won't notice the application's ban, should it happen, its effects, both commercial and



political, will have lasting consequences.

#### **Cap Planning Gets Project Updates**



At the December 9 meeting of the Mattapoisett Capital Planning Committee town administrator Mike Lorenco gave a status report on a variety of multi-phase multi-dollar projects.

Topping the list was the Main Street (village streets) construction project. Lorenco said that design currently stands at 20-percent and that an arborist has been hired to assist with planting and tree removal planning. During a June information session public comments were received and various traffic flow issues and ideas were floated such as one way travel on Water Street. The town has been working with the state on utilities design.

Lorenco shared that long before any work can be scheduled some 120 easements would have to be granted for things like material storage and equipment. Also the culvert at the town beach on Water Street had to be







replaced. Water lines with an estimated price tag of \$20 million need to be considered.

Regarding the Pearl Street project, Lorenco said that project which the town had approved along with Oakland Street at an estimated cost of \$1.4 million, will go out to bid in the coming weeks with a spring start date and that Oakland Street underground services (gas, sewer, and water) were complete. He said an asphalt overlay is planned. However, he cautioned that the \$1.4 million will not be enough given current pricing.

Long Wharf reconstruction project is at a bit



of a stall presently. Additional borings confirmed site conditions as amenable to repairs but that materials for the project had yet to be decided.

Improvements to the Highway Department Building are moving along and the floor drains have been completed. But the discovery of asbestos required extra work. He forecasted that this project should com in close to budget at \$350,000. Lorenco also noted that exhaust fans have been installed.

Student work on the Holy Ghost Grounds building which included flooring, electrical with new panel and fixtures is ongoing with the students from Old Colony "plugging along."

Library repairs with the exception of the slate roof are funded up to \$45,000 for carpet replacement yet to be done. Also pending is a full feasibility study for Town Hall Lorenco noted. In May 2023 \$35,000 was appropriated for the study he said. Regarding repairs to Town Hall he said that holes in the roof had been patched, exterior trim and painting was complete, "...the animals can't get in."

On the topic of vehicles he reminded the committee of the year or more wait times for new vehicle deliveries. Both the Highway Department and the Police Department (a new ambulance) are waiting for deliveries.

The bike path's next phase was mentioned at a possible cost of \$3 million. Lorenco said that funding was a "big question mark" but that grants would be sought, "...it may have to go through the TIP process."

Lorenco also touched on debt saying that while the library and local schools are rolling off the payment schedule, the new fire station is rolling on.

Recently completed projects include a new generator for the housing authority, Old Slough Road,



Mattapoisett Neck Road sidewalk, car charging stations at Mattapoisett Police and Depot Street, dredging of the inner harbor, municipal fiber optic loop, ADA transition plan, Legion Hall repairs and ADA upgrades and relocation of town server to the fire station.

Next meeting of the Mattapoisett Capital Planning Committee to be announced.

# Request for Determination of Applicability Denied

Mattapoisett Conservation Commission

A Request for Determination of Applicability filing was turned down on December 9 when the Mattapoisett Conservation Commission reviewed the filing brought by Colin Labrie, 7 Hollywood Road.

The filing was for the removal of trees within the 100-foot wetlands boundary an area subject to coastal storm flowage. Representing the applicant was Chris Vandenberg of Civil Environmental Consultants who quickly found the commission members in opposition to his plans. The commission indicated that the applicant's site activities to date already constituted a violation and



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
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that a Notice of Intent filing was in order.

The commission acted on the RDA by giving it a positive determination and that requires an NOI filing.

An NOI filed by Eric Smith for the construction of a single-family home, located at 0 Grand Avenue, was continued while an NOI filed by Thomas Holt, 39 Mattapoisett Neck Road, also for a single-family home, was conditioned.

Two of four requests for Certificates of Compliance were granted, being Nicholas Leblanc, Lot 83 Shagbark Circle, and Long Built Homes for Lot 90 Shagbark Circle. Exception was taken for two other COC requests because the engineer of record did not certify compliance to conditions. Requests from Craig Medeiros Esq. for COCs for 21 Fieldstone Drive (two certificates) were denied and engineering certification requested.

A continued NOI for James DePierre, 20 Cove Street for the razing of an existing structure and the construction of a new residence was conditioned.

Coming before the commission was David Davignon with a requested and received a withdrawal without prejudice for Approved Amended Orders of Conditions (SE44-1503, SE44-1524, SE44-1520, and SE44-



1526) for landscaping in and near a barrier beach that would have included technical features due to possible storm surge erosion in the future for property located on Good Speed Island.

The next meeting of the Mattapoisett Conservation Commission is scheduled for December 23.

#### **Deliberation on High Street Development**

Rochester Planning Board

Rochester's Planning Board Tuesday endorsed one Approval Not Required application for a proposed house lot at 0 High St. but extended the hearing for three other lots that are part of the same project after the developer's representative refused to accept the condition the panel wanted to place on those parcels.

For lots six, seven, and eight along Forbes Road, the board wanted to add the condition that these parcels be stamped 'non-buildable' because they lay too close to the Connet Woods housing development and might need to adhere to covenants and rules of that development's Homeowners Association. This, board members said, would require discussion and a meeting of the minds between the two projects.

Project engineer Brian Wallace, who attended the meeting via Zoom, said he disagreed with adding this condition. He said the design of these house lots will not change from what is being presented.

David Arancio, a trustee of the Connet Woods Homeowners Association, started the conversation by noting these lots are so close to Connet Woods that it would become part of the Connet development without having to adhere to its special rules and restrictions. Board member Ben Bailey advised Wallace



that it would be easier for him and the board to accept the condition. Wallace said he preferred a continuance to the next meeting instead but also that "more discussion needs to happen."

Arancio said he was disheartened to hear push back from Wallace rather than allowing the attorneys for the project and the town to get together and find common ground.

The hearing for the three single-family dwellings with attached garage on two-acre lots that will utilize pieces of neighboring cranberry bogs was continued to January 14, 2025.

In other action, the board reviewed a Site Plan Review application filed by Eversource for a new substation interconnecting generation facilities at 214 Rounsville Road. Eversource representative Heather Sykes said this is an upgrade that will help meet the town's future energy goals and improve utility service. The board continued this hearing until January 14 to give the town's consulting engineer, Ken Motta, time to review and comment on the plan.

The board conducted public hearings on the bylaw amendments proposed for the January 28 Special Town Meeting.



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The board recommended approval of proposed changes to Large Scale Solar Photovoltaic Installation regulations that strengthen the conditions for adequate screening and a proposal for new battery storage systems regulations.

The board added language to the bylaw amendment proposal adding rules for short-term rentals. The Planning Board will be charged with granting a Special Permit for any property owners who wish to operate a short-term rental.

The board also considered favorably proposals

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to eliminate use variances and add a new section to the Agricultural Land Residential District to address the

state's new accessory dwelling unit regulations.

#### **CPA Funding Will Be Competitive**

Mattapoisett Community Preservation Act Committee

The Mattapoisett Community Preservation Committee has begun meeting in preparation for Spring Town Meeting at which time grant applications will have been vetted by the committee as acceptable to the process and therefore ready for the town to vote on.

According to committee chairman Chuck McCullough, grants from five entities were received. Those are \$50,000 for restoration of the town owned Barlow Cemetery, \$50,000 requested by the town's Historical Commission for the continuation of memorializing the town's historic resources (as mandated by the state's charge for such commissions), \$65,000 sought by the Mattapoisett Museum for the



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
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carriage house access compliance, \$85,553 for American Legion hall upgrades, and \$23,332 requested by the Marion Institute for a community based garden at Old Hammontown School.

In a separate message to all applicants, McCullough noted the following: "This year the CPA Committee has been presented with five requests for funds totaling \$250,000. The five requests are seeking historical or open space/recreation funds. The fund balances for the historical and open space/recreation CPA categories now total approximately \$85,000.

We do have undesignated funds available to backfill any shortfall of funds in other categories, but the committee is very protective of the undesignated funds needing to ensure that we're able to support emergency situations that may come before the committee. This is a very competitive year for CPA Funds and the committee's focus will be to sort out the high priority needs from the lower priority wants. It will be important that you be prepared to breakout the priority needs and to be prepared to segment the project, if possible, over a period of years."

After the first of the year, one-on-one interviews



will be scheduled to more fully explore the grant applications with the applicants and ask specific questions that will better inform the committee members. The committee members are Bob Spooner, Margaret DeMello, Michelle Hughes, Jim Pierson, Bill Hall, and Karen Field.

#### **Good News in Marion Schools**

From meeting the new school service dog, strong MCAS scores, and celebrating the district's first Feinstein Foundation Golden ticket award, the Marion School Committee on December 5 was filled with good news.

Sippican Elementary School third-grader Rose O'Brien, a Feinstein school for her good deeds, won a random drawing that helped garner \$5,000 for the school and \$500 for a charity of O'Brien's choice.

O'Brien, who says she helps take care of her grandmother, chose to donate the \$500 to the town's Council on Aging.

At first, I didn't even know I was winning and later in the day they told me I was a winner," O'Brien told the School Committee, adding that she wants to help "the old people of the community."

"It was a perfect fit, and we are so excited," Sippican Principal Lynn Dessert said at last Thursday's meeting. "I am really excited about Rose's choice, and I had a conversation with Rose about what she thought was important."

"Our youngest generation here at Suppican will be helping our older generation at the Council on Aging," School Superintendent Michael Nelson said.

Sippican Assistant Principal Gregory Thomas also reported on some positive charitable work of students. He said \$2,000 was donated by the Feinstein Foundation to the food pantry. Another \$2,000 was donated for the school's giving tree on which students conduct good deeds, write about it and it goes on a tree.

Along with charitable acts, Marion students were touted for their solid work on last year's MCAS tests.

Dessert and Sharlene Fedorowicz, assistant superintendent of teaching and learning, reported that most students in grades 3 through 6 surpassed the state average in English, Mathematics, and Science.

Only Grade 4 did not experience strong growth, but Federowicz stressed that those students started

kindergarten remotely and spent Grade 1 learning through masks worn by both teachers and staff.

She and other school leaders credited extra learning programs and a revamped curriculum toward the town surpassing the state average.

On that note, the School Committee later that evening voted to approve a \$3,900 grant it has received from the state for professional development – something that also will harness growth in teaching and learning.

In other news, the School Committee was introduced to Sippican's new, most popular staff member: Norman the service dog.

School Resource Officer Jonathan Tracy said Norman, an 8-month-old golden labrador retriever, has walked students to class and has greeted many visitors at the SRO office.

His presence in the school has helped brighten the day of many students, some of whom have had bad days lifted up by the school's new furry friend.

"The benefits of it – I have seen every single day," Tracy said, adding that kids having tough days have been escorted to class by Norman.

"He is very well behaved and loves the kids,"



Tracy said.

School officials said they plan on making "Norman" stuffed animals and awarding hard-working students – aptly calling it the Norman Award.

The School Committee also introduced new art teacher Joanne Smith, a longtime art teacher who started in the district in 1997.

Smith said she was happy to rejoin the tri-town family, where she started as an educator.

Nelson said he visited her art class and was happy to see the great art experiences of the students.



The School Committee voted to dispose of old and some old and outdated math and science textbooks. Nelson said, citing his conversation with Dessert, that the advent of online learning has made some of these books obsolete. He said disposing of them will free up classroom and storage spaces.

The School Committee will meet again on January 30 at the Sippican Elementary School.



# Public Review Period for Revised Electricity Aggregation Plan

The Town of Marion is holding a 30-day public review period for its revised aggregation plan for Marion Community Electricity Aggregation. Marion CEA is our Town's official electricity supply program, active since 2016.

The aggregation plan describes how our electricity program is structured and operated. Marion secured approval for our original aggregation plan from the Department of Public Utilities (DPU) in 2015. In July 2024, the DPU issued new rules for aggregation plans, called "Guidelines for Municipal Aggregators". The Guidelines expand local authority for cities and towns concerning the operation of their programs and increase public transparency about program operations. The revisions to our aggregation plan ensure that the plan aligns with the new Guidelines.

The revised plan will not impact Marion CEA's current electricity supply options and prices which are fixed until November 2025 through our supply contract with Constellation. No action is required by existing participants to continue receiving the current pricing.

Barbara Whitehead Silva, 93, of Mattapoisett, Massachusetts died peacefully at home on Monday, December 2, 2024. She was the daughter of the late Charles "Carlie" Whitehead and Blanche Whitehead of Dartmouth, MA, and mother of Lisa A. Grace, and grandmother of Matthew R. Grace.

Barbara was a graduate of Dartmouth High School. She was a devout Catholic and long-time parishioner of St. Anthony's Church in Mattapoisett. She donated regularly to the Mattapoisett police and emergency services departments, as well as to United States Veterans. Barbara held her extended family and friends close to her heart. Referred to as Baba by her loved ones, she raised and impacted many generations amongst her family, friends, colleagues, and community.

Barbara was the former President/CEO of First Citizens' Federal Credit Union, starting in the early 1950's as Treasurer, she served the bank for 45 years. Barbara led their growth from a state-chartered credit union to a federally-chartered credit union in the 1980's, as well as their expansion from their Bristol county headquarters in New Bedford to several branches and counties throughout Massachusetts.

Barbara was a committed member of the communities in the South Coast of Massachusetts, particularly New Bedford, and was a business leader at a time when women were in the extreme minority. Barbara served many area orga-

nizations, including as former Trustee of St. Luke's Hospital; Board Member of the Massachusetts Small Business Loan Review Board, the United Way, and New Bedford Junior Achievement; Board Member and Chairperson of the New Bedford Area Chamber of Commerce, Director of the Credit Union National Association (CUNA) of Massachusetts, and Executive Committee Member of the Economic Development Corporation of Greater New Bedford. She was the first woman inducted into the New Bedford Area Business Hall of Fame in 1985 and received the Citation Award from the American Business Women's Association in 1987.

A private Funeral Mass will be held for her family. A celebration of Barbara's life will be held at the Country Club of New Bedford (where she was a member for over 30 years) on Saturday, December 14, from 11am to 2pm. The celebration is open to all who knew and loved Barbara.

# From the Files of the Rochester Historical Society

The Rochester Historical Society, begun in 1967, has been around long enough to be considered historical in its own right. Like any organization with longevity, it has undergone changes over the years.

The Society founders bonded over discovering the histories of their old homes and also creating maps of Rochester through its over 200 years. With each map moving from century to century, they added roads, businesses and homes of residents with the names of the people living there at the time.

Because the Society had no building to call its own, meetings were held at the homes of members, often accompanied by a meal. Any items donated to the group had to be stored at these same member's homes. Most meetings were for members only. Many projects were proposed and there was a constant search for a place to



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make it into a museum.

They held antique shows, helped plan the celebrations for the Bicentennial and more whole-heartedly, the 300th anniversary of Rochester. They conducted historic tours of town, spoke about the town's history to groups, and held Thankful suppers,

Finally, in 2003, the East Rochester Congregational Church became the Rochester Historical Society Museum. In the following 21 years, the mission of the Society has expanded with most if not all meetings and events open to the public. Monthly meetings with speakers sharing



historical knowledge or expertise, yearly exhibits, along with bake sales, an annual yard sale, concerts and special outdoor events have helped us to share Rochester's history.

In the past, the Society had Christmas parties for the members.

# MOVIE REVIEW



# Chaos

Cop1941 (1979). Starring John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd. Directed by Steven Spielberg. Running time: 118 minutes. MPAA rating: PG. Available on home physical and streaming media.

Ah, the critics back there in 1979. They didn't know. Walking into Steven Spielberg's epic slapstick farce 1941, which came out 45 years ago on December 14, they didn't realize they were in for a live-action cartoon. They also didn't know what was coming just two years later.

Perhaps it's only because I first happened to catch 1941 on cable around the same time *Raiders of the Lost Ark* came out, but it has always been my belief that 1941 was no more or less than a dry run for the *Indiana Jones* films. It has the same look, the same sound (John Williams' score is hysterically over-amped); with a tweak here and there, it could plausibly be unfolding in the same reality. Indy fights Nazis in 1936; five years later, one of them (Christopher Lee) turns up on a Japanese sub.

So if you go into 1941 looking at it as Indy's scrappier younger brother, with its pants around its ankles and firing a pistol into the California night sky, you might have a better time with it. The movie is explicitly Spielberg's attempt to wield farce on the level of It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World, stuffed with stars and chaos, a gigantic Mad-magazine parody of itself. Everyone in the huge cast bellows and shrieks, and for good measure they all reprise their screaming during the end credits. 1941 is loud.

The movie became a stick with which to slap Spielberg down. He'd had two big hits in a row; now he would be made to eat dirt. But really there's nothing to be ashamed of here. There's a surfeit of diversions here, legions of characters chasing each other around, locked into their own violent, fearful or sexual obsessions. The perversity runs wild: the movie kicks off with a goofball riff on *Jaws*; the then-hot comedy team of John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd are in the movie but never share a scene; if there's an actual protagonist, it's hoofer Bobby DiCicco, who just wants to enter a USO dance contest.

If, on some level, you can't relish the scenes between Christopher Lee and sub commander Toshiro Mifune — especially when Slim Pickens drops in for some cornpone scatological yucks (Mifune's crestfallen "This has not been honorable" always cracks me up) — well, I don't know what to tell you. Similarly, the meeting of Belushi's deranged Wild Bill Kelso and Warren Oates' equally deranged Colonel "Madman" Maddox — two grizzled icons of different generations squinting at each other and taking one another's demented measure. Or Treat Williams'



scummy corporal who has a thing against eggs. Or Ned Beatty allowing an anti-aircraft gun on his property, to the consternation of wife Lorraine Gary. Or the way Aykroyd looks perfectly at home as a sergeant rattling off tech specs. Or Robert

Stack's Major General Stilwell — the film's only voice of sanity — shedding tears during a screening of *Dumbo*.

There's no way a movie this massive, this dedicated to craziness, and this *fun* needs to justify itself on any level. There's a lavish, colorful entertainer at work in *1941* and the first two *Indy* films that now seems long lost. Until he remade *West Side Story* decades later, *1941* was the closest Spielberg had ever come to mounting a full-fledged musical, and I wish it had done better at the box office if only so that we could've gotten more brilliantly inspired sequences like the jitterbug number, which degenerates into a messy brawl, which critics took as a metaphor for the film itself.

1941 is chaotic because it seeks to tell, in slapstick terms, a story of American hysteria — the script by Bob Gale and Robert Zemeckis was based loosely, in part, on the actual "Battle of Los Angeles," in which a still-unknown thing in the sky led to the Army pretty much losing their minds and perforating the night air with shells. 1941 shows that Spielberg was not always the somber WWII chronicler of Saving Private Ryan, prostrating himself at the graves of the Greatest Generation. Here, the Greatest Generation is a bunch of morons. America is stupid. But Japan is stupid, too — they don't even have a working compass on their sub. Everyone (except Stilwell) is stupid. It's a farce, an antipatriotic farce post-Vietnam.

Is it, uh, perfect? Getouddahere. The women tend to be floozies, ditzes or straight-up nymphos (Nancy Allen as a reporter who gets aroused when she's up in a plane, much to Tim Matheson's delight). The racism of the day is exploited for laughs (more so in the extended cut on DVD, which fleshes out the conflict between Frank McRae and John Candy). But, again, pretty much everyone in the movie is a suitable case for treatment. Charges of sexism/racism don't stick to a happy calamity like this movie, which sprays everyone with the same mix of soot, slime and raw eggs. I love 1941. I don't apologize to you, or my fellow critics, or even Spielberg for that. I saw it at precisely the right time, eleven years old, grew up on the Little Rascals and "Nyuk nyuk" and Looney Tunes, and so knew what I was watching. Does the rest of the world know what this film is? I guess not.

These efforts complement ASPR's ongoing distribution of free COVID-19 tests to long-term care facilities, low-income senior housing, uninsured individuals, and underserved communities. Through this community organization distribution program and the home-ordering program, ASPR has provided a combined total of more than 1.9 billion COVID-19 over-the-counter tests.

As the fall and holiday seasons will create increased close proximity gatherings of people, the Administration remains committed to helping Americans access tests to help so that, if they develop a respiratory illness, they can learn whether it is due to COVID-19 and then make the best choices about seeking medical care and reducing risks to family, friends, and co-workers.
